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The second day of the workshop sought to implement an innovative interactive design to bridge the academicpractitioner divide on issues pertaining to sustainable consumption. Participants engaged in paired dialogues and other interactive activities to outline theories of change, to discuss framing and communication, to identify innovative business models, and to highlight practical cases and citizen movement activities. # Memories of Ken Green (1946-2009)

The special issue of Technology Analysis and Strategic Management is dedicated to Ken Green (1946-2009), Professor of environmental innovation management at the University of Manchester.

Ken was an old friend, a colleague, and the best man in Halina's and my wedding in 2005. My memories of Ken go back to the 70s, when I first heard him speak at an event called the "Communist University of London." He was funny, witty, smart, and articulate, and I wanted to know him better. What we shared was our passion to create a better world, in the 70s through democratization and socialism, now more through environmental activities and sustainability, teaching and research. In the late 80s I spent half a year with him at Manchester University, where we collaborated, discussed, frequented the pubs, and went on 'history walks' through Manchester, where Ken pointed out the places where our famous predecessors like Marx and Engels had been, and where the workers uprisings took place.

In the 90s we kept contact, and Ken came to stay for a year in Delft University, where I invited him as a guest professor for the group Technology Assessment. Ken loved to live in Delft and enjoyed it greatly; and the TA group was very happy to have him. On the last afternoon of his sabbatical we sat and relaxed in my garden in Leidschendam, in the sun, and talked about what to do next to keep contact and the momentum going. This is how the SusHouse project was born, out of an idea that we needed to shift our attention from Sustainable production, innovation, and technology, to consumption and households. The project was subsequently funded by the EU. This was the beginning of one of the greatest projects that I participated in, and Ken and I worked closely together to make it into a success. This included many meetings, one of them in Manchester, where Ken organized another great walking tour as well as a fabulous 'green' dinner.

SusHouse inspired Ken to develop further his interest in sustainable food, and he brought his knowledge and charm to many places, including the IHDP and the DEFRA, the UK Ministry of food and environment. He became the driving force of the TESCO-funded Sustainable Consumption Institute, and was active in the Tyndall Centre for Climate change, the EU SCORE! project for sustainable consumption, and numerous other places and projects. Ken also loved to teach, and he did it again with wit, enthusiasm, and charm, and a great deal of knowledge.

To quote from an obituary: "Professor Green combined academic rigor with an irrepressible sense of humor - a recent lecture was entitled "Give Peas a Chance!" He personified a style of academic inquiry informed by interdisciplinary knowledge and social commitment - a vital combination that is becoming less and less visible in the modern university landscape. He had some private passions, such as the history of Manchester and the electoral peculiarities of other nations. Most of all, he was known by students, colleagues and friends as a man of great personal warmth and humanity, who was also devoted to his wife, two sons and wider family."

I remember Ken as a great friend, colleague, and inspirator, his witty humor, and his engagement. We all still miss him.
