Recent Graduates

SCORAI is delighted to announce that Marlyne Sahakian (Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, Geneva) and Emily Huddart Kennedy (University of Alberta) have recently defended their PhD thesis. Abstracts of their dissertations appear below.

Staying Cool: Towards a Deeper Understanding of Household Energy Consumption in Metro Manila, the Philippines (Marlyne Sahakian)

This doctoral research in development studies is focused on understanding the meaning of environmentally significant consumption practices among households from different socioeconomic groups in Metro Manila, the Philippines--from lowincome housing communities to luxurious gated communities. Mixed methodology, including qualitative interviews, observations and discourse analysis, was used to uncover practices related to electricity consumption for lighting and cooling in the home. One main finding is that energy and electricity are not relevant in and of themselves: cool air provides comfort, a social construct, but also allows for adherence to western fashion clothing trends among the most affluent groups, what is being called a "secondary service" of cooling. In low-income housing and among the growing middle-income groups, the material dimension of housing structures may be locking-in energy consumption trends: mechanical ventilation is used in homes with no passive cooling capacity, and often designed with "west is best" housing style preferences that are inappropriate for local climatic conditions.

When assessing opportunities for transitions to reduced energy consumption in this context, the research concludes that an increasingly global discourse on individual responsibility when it comes to environmental issues may be deflecting attention away from citizenship and political action towards broader, institutional change.

Reclaiming Consumption: Sustainability, Social Networks, and Urban Context (Emily Huddart Kennedy)

Does the neighbourhood you live in change your consumption habits? Is there a relationship between quality of life and sustainable consumption? Reclaiming consumption is advanced as a theoretical lens through which to understand how some households are able to engage in a wide array of sustainable practices while also encouraging others to do the same. Domains of sustainable practices examined include eating, mobility, leisure and travel, and maintaining the household. Qualitative indepth interviews were used to shed light on the importance of peer-to-peer learning for reclaiming consumption and to explore the potential of neighbourhood networks to act as agents of social change. A survey was used to compare the consumption practices of suburban and urban residents. The survey results show that suburban residents are more likely to adopt cost-intensive acts (e.g., buying high quality goods) than time-intensive behaviours (e.g., hanging laundry to dry). Reclaiming consumption is more readily achieved in an area with public meeting points, a conspicuous presence of households committed to reducing material consumption, and the opportunity to display one's sustainable actions to others.
