# Global Research Forum on Sustainable Consumption and Production, June 13-15, Rio de Janeiro

The results of the recent Rio+20 conference may have been disappointing, but there are a few positive aspects that should not be ignored. The institutional framework for global sustainable development has been strengthened, with more powers for the United Nations Environment Program; the ten-year Framework of Programs on Sustainable Consumption and Production has been adopted (albeit vaguely); and by 2014 we expect to have Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). One of the challenges will be to ensure that sustainable consumption, or sufficiency goals, are incorporated into these SDGs. This may be possible if framed as "resource efficiency and sufficiency."

I personally did not expect a lot from the "official" conference, but saw it as an opportunity for many people and organizations to meet, exchange ideas, and develop new plans and energy. In that sense the conference was successful. This achievement was, of course, greatly enhanced by the People's Summit which was held in the "real old" center of Rio (as opposed to the humongous airport-like conference center that was quite inappropriately called "Rio Centro" in order to confuse everybody.

As many readers of this newsletter already know, SCORAI played an important role (together with other organizations like the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES), Sustainable Europe Research Institute (SERI), Integrated Strategies Forum (ISF), OneEarth, Green Liberty, Partnership for Education and Research about Responsible Living (PERL), Consumers International, and the Tellus Institute) to forge the Global Research Forum on Sustainable Consumption and Production (GRF-SCP). GRF-SCP organized a major inaugural workshop in Rio, just before the "official" conference, from June 13-15, at the Escola Superior de Propaganda e Marketing (ESPM) in the center of old Rio (details on the event are available <a href="here">here</a>). GRF-SCP also organized a <a href="workshop">workshop</a> on June 11th during the International Council for Scientific Union's Forum on Science, Technology and Innovation for Sustainable Development, participated in the "Rio Dialogues on Sustainable Consumption (with the Brazilian Minister of the Environment) on June 12th; and convened a side event at the "official" Rio+20 conference on June 19th.

The workshop at the ICSU Forum gave GRF-SCP visibility in the science community and access to its major new research initiative <u>Future Earth</u>. It will be a challenge for us to participate in this major new international research program and CRE would be greateful for SCOR Alls help and

The GRF-SCP workshop was seen as a great success by its participants and sponsors: both in terms of participation (80-90 international participants); local organization (very smooth thanks to ESPM); fun (the cultural evening with performances by participants was great); and content (about 35 papers delivered, four keynotes; and plenty of good discussions and breakout sessions).

The keynotes were given by Chee Yoke Ling (Third World Centre) on "A Southern Perspective," Jacqueline McGlade (European Environmental Agency) on "Planet Re-think," a joint presentation by Tim Jackson and Peter Victor on "Ecological macroeconomics," and Adrian Smith of Science and Technology Policy Research Unit (Sussex University) on "Grassroots Innovations." The other papers were briefly presented in accordance with the "SCORAI Model" with ample time for discussion. They were grouped under the headings: long-term visions and trends; green innovation; green economy or degrowth?; lifestyles; culture; policy; education; and mapping knowledge, practice, and leadership.

The overarching problem statement for the workshop was framed in the following terms: Environmental, social, and economic unsustainable situations are driven by our consumption habits and our production structures. Neither government policies nor activism has thus far any meaningful remedies. Consumerist culture and structures have spread quickly around the world, with disastrous effects for the environment and our resource base. The rich consume much more than the poor (but are not much happier). For the poor and the middle class, jobs, sustainable livelihoods, and self-realization should be emphasized, rather than increased consumption.

The outcomes of the workshop can be summarized as (and please forgive me for not being exhaustive):

- It is inappropriate to blame individual consumers for unsustainable practices as they are part of a complex system.
- Consumers can be influenced by more than rational arguments and data (persuasion and peer pressure).
- Technology can assist a process of transition, but other mechanisms will be necessary (cultural and value change; economic instruments, choice editing).
- The supply side and governments have important roles to play.
- Interaction between researchers and practitioners is sometimes difficult, but needs to be improved.
- Developing countries and Eastern Europe are rapidly catching up with respect to consumption, but it is not clear if and how they will find an alternative path.
- Addressing unsustainable consumption in the global South is complex because of parallel
  persisting poverty and sometimes the existence of a "bling culture" of conspicuous
  consumption and status-motivated demonstration effects.
- It is important to distinguish between green consumerism and sustainable consumption as well as between weak and strong sustainable consumption
- Consumption is an overtly political activity and it should be analyzed through the lens of political-economy perspectives.
- Education is key, for all ages, but especially for the young.
- Advertisements should be tamed and greened.
- Concepts underlying the solidarity economy, grassroots innovations, and ethical consumption need to be further developed.
- Macro-economic modeling does not give conclusive evidence that degrowth is desirable or possible.
- Leadership is key.
- Mapping the movement and conceptualizing interactions between researchers and practitioners need to be further developed.

As you can see, the outcomes of this workshop reflect as much the wish to conceptually integrate various perspectives and disciplines, but also (activist) wishes to bring about systemic change. In this sense it was a successful blend of academia and activism. We are still working on a more balanced evaluation; as well as an official workshop report; a report on the facilitation; and on a special academic journal issue with many of the papers.


Finally, at the UN Rio+20 Side Event the objectives of GRF-SCP were presented as:

- To bring together SPC researchers and practitioners from around the world.
- To discuss SPC research papers, achievements, and research gaps.
- To evaluate SPC policies and civil society actions, achievements, and policy and action gaps.
- To create a global community of SPC researchers and practitioners.
- To transcend disciplinary and regional boundaries.
- To address complex systemic questions

We hope to be able to provide (perhaps in time for the next issue of this newsletter!) a more detailed plan for the future. We are looking forward to a fruitful collaboration between GRF and SCORAI.

In Bregenz, Austria and on May 1, 2012, SCORAI hosted its first Trans-Atlantic workshop around the theme, "Sustainable Consumption During Times of Crisis". Following this successful event that brought together researchers from North America and Eastern/Western Europe, a session dedicated to SCORAI took place within the larger European Roundtable for Sustainable Consumption and Production conference (May 2-4). In that session, it was unanimously agreed that creating a

SCORAI Europe would help strengthen the sustainable consumption community in Europe, both in terms of research and practice. Upcoming activities of SCORAI Europe in 2012-2013 will include: sharing conference proceedings from Bregenz workshop on the SCORAI web site; participating in the 2013 ERSCP conference in Istanbul early June 2013; and potentially another workshop in Europe in spring 2013.

#### **Post-Automobile Futures**

Dr. Maurie Cohen is launching an online discussion forum devoted to "post-automobile futures" and would welcome hearing from anyone who might have an interest in participating in such an initiative. As currently conceived, the forum would be devoted to exchanges related to emergent points of weakness in the current personal car regime (e.g., lack of interest in automobiles among younger drivers, spread of urban bicycle-oriented lifestyles, role of increasing inequality in declining access to automobility). Contributions are anticipated from the socio-technical transitions and sustainable consumption research communities, but hopefully the forum will not be limited just to these groups. The intention at present is for the forum to be simply a "reply all" discussion list, but depending on uptake of this idea over time it may move toward a more formalized communication platform.

A related possibility is for this forum to serve as a preliminary discussion space for individuals with an interest in participating in a session (or two) on the theme of post-automobile futures at the <u>SCORAI conference</u> scheduled to take place at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts in June 2013. A direct email response to Dr. Maurie Cohen (mcohen@adm.njit.edu) would be the most appropriate way to signal your intention in participating in this stream of activity.

#### **SCORAI 2013 Conference**

SCORAI is organizing an international conference to be held on June 12-14, 2013, at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts. Scholars working in the field of sustainable consumption will convene to better understand the connections between material consumption and societal well-being and to chart transition pathways toward a more sustainable future. The aim is to formulate options for post-consumerist lifestyles, social institutions, and economic systems in wealthy countries of the global North. The 2013 Conference at Clark University will follow three previous SCORAI workshops held in North America at Clark (2009), Princeton (2011), and Vancouver (2012) and a Trans-Atlantic workshop in Austria (2012).

The formal call for abstracts will be issued on July 15. At that time we will invite proposals for sessions and individual papers based on theoretical and applied research focusing on the above issues. We especially welcome contributions from interdisciplinary research that addresses, but is not limited to, such topics as: subjective and social wellbeing, socio-technical transitions, evolution of

social practices in a technological society and their ecological impacts, local innovations in alternative systems of provisions and lifestyles (including grassroots initiatives), new economic and institutional models in the context of ecological limits, and the role and prospects for social movements toward a post-consumerist society (including the emergence of compelling future visions). We also welcome scholarly contributions that address sustainable consumption in the context of political power and institutional structures as well as the role of academic community in affecting a transition to a sustainable future.

## Peoples' Sustainability Manifesto For Action Beyond RIO+20, June 2012

The fourteen <u>Peoples' Sustainability Treaties</u>, evolved through a consultative process with hundreds of civil society organizations, converged at the Rio+20 to launch a <u>Manifesto</u> on the final day of the Rio summit. They have declared that another world is possible after Rio+20 and pledged their commitment to a transition toward increasingly sustainable futures on earth.
