A SCORAI Europe Workshop

<u>SCORAI Europe</u> has issued a Call for Papers and Participation for an exciting workshop titled "**Bridging Across Communities and Cultures Towards Sustainable Consumption**", taking place on June 4 directly before the <u>2013 ERSCP-EMSU at</u> <u>Boğaziçii University in Istanbul</u>.

The workshop aims to explore how we can better apprehend existing changes towards more sustainable forms of consumption, as well as how such efforts could be replicated across different communities and cultures. We take a broad reading of "communities and cultures" to include varying geographic and social contexts, but also different types of interest groups, from the business community to civil society, from households to the public sector. SCORAI Draft Program Available

The draft program for the <u>SCORAI conference</u> to be held on June 12-14 at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts is now available via the <u>SCORAI website</u>. An abstract book outlining the papers to be presented can be downloaded as well. The conference will comprise nearly 100 presentations by scholars working in the field of sustainable consumption, several policy briefings by national and international experts, and a concluding plenary dialogue.

Also part of the program will be keynote lectures by **John Fullerton** (founder of the <u>Capital Institute</u>), **Sheldon Garon** (Professor of History and East Asian Studies at Princeton University and author of <u>Beyond Our Means: Why America</u> <u>Spends While the World Saves</u>), and **Carol Graham** (Brookings <u>Institution</u> and University of Maryland and author of <u>The Pursuit of</u> <u>Happiness: An Economy of Well-Being and Happiness Around</u> the World: The Paradox of Happy Peasants and Miserable <u>Millionaires</u>).

The conference schedule will also include a business meeting where there will be a discussion of the future of SCORAI. Participation and broad engagement in this session is actively encouraged! Dispelling Myths About Sustainable Consumption: Upcoming Webinar

Successful strategies for promoting sustainable consumption require an understanding of human behavior, but most policymakers and other leaders don't have the time to become an expert in consumer decision making! The academic research on how to promote sustainable lifestyles is complex and comes from a range of disciplines. As a result, many rely on "common knowledge" and assumptions about consumer behavior, which may be only partially true if true at all.

This webinar presents the preliminary results of the project, funded by the Nordic Council of Ministers, which aims to uncover existing scientific evidence on consumption and to **give policy makers a deeper understanding of the knowledge on consumption behavior in a more accessible format**, thereby challenging the myths and enabling effective policy.

This webinar discusses "myths" about consumption behavior such as:

Green consumption is the solution to unsustainable

patterns and levels of consumption.

- If everyone does a little we will achieve a lot.
- More information leads to sustainable behavior.
- Consumption policies are too controversial and will not be accepted by the public.

The Role of Green "ICT" in Sustainable Consumption

During the past months a series of knowledge brokerage events were held across Europe, each of them dealing with specific areas of sustainable consumption. At the most recent event that took place in Vienna (1/17-1/18), leading sustainability experts debated the <u>role of Green ICT for Sustainable Consumption</u> in Europe.

Modern Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) can have a great influence on shaping a more sustainable world. The mega-trends Cloud Computing and Smart Systems in the areas of energy, transport and housing, have the potential to substantially reduce environmental impacts and, thus, green Europe's future. The time to adjust the future development of these technologies is now, say Europe's leading ICT-specialists. Last week, more than 50 professionals from 20 countries across Europe, the US and Australia discussed in Vienna how ICT can increase energy and resource efficiency and make consumption more sustainable. In an ever faster digitizing world, the positive potentials of ICTs are great, say the experts. Yet, using the chances involves substantial challenges for policy makers and Europe's regulatory institutions. The event "Green ICT for Sustainable Consumption?" was organized by the Institute of the Environment and Regional Development of the Vienna University of Economics and Business. It is one of several events taking place in the course of the European Knowledge Brokerage project RESPONDER.

<u>RESPONDER</u> is a European project funded within the 7th EU Framework Programme, aiming to link research and policy making in the area of Sustainable Consumption with the debates about economic growth.
