Don't Miss the Early-Bird Registration Deadline for the SCORAI Conference

There are only a few more days to take advantage of early-bird registration for the SCORAI Conference at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts on June 12-14. Participants who register before this date can attend the three-day event for a discounted fee of \$300 (afterward the regular registration fee increases to \$350). Also available is a downloadable copy of the draft program outlining more than 100 presentations by scholars working in the field of sustainable consumption, several policy briefings by national and international experts, and a concluding plenary dialogue.

The conference program additionally features keynote lectures by <u>John Fullerton</u> (founder of the Capital Institute), <u>Sheldon Garon</u> (Professor of History and East Asian Studies at Princeton University and author of Beyond Our Means: Why America Spends While the World Saves), and <u>Carol Graham</u> (Fellow at the Brookings Institution, Professor at the University of Maryland, and author of The Pursuit of Happiness: An Economy of Well-Being and Happiness Around the World: The Paradox of Happy Peasants and Miserable Millionaires).

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Notes from the field: New Oregon initiative advances sustainable materials management

The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) recently completed an innovative new strategy Materials Management in Oregon: 2050 Vision and Framework for Action which takes a more holistic, sustainable approach to managing the materials humans consume, recycle and discard. As an update to the state's more traditional waste management plan, the 2050 Vision reflects a shift from managing wastes to managing materials through the full life cycle of design, production and use.

The "vision" part of the document describes "a future where Oregonians produce and use materials responsibly - conserving resources, protecting the environment and living well. The "framework" section includes a variety of actions Oregon could take to engage designers, producers and consumers and will help DEQ effectively shape state policies and programs to address the plan's goals.

In developing the 2050 Vision, DEQ staff drew upon current research on such topics as sustainable production and consumption to inform their analysis of the most promising policy interventions. A number of white papers were published to support this strategy including:

- Literature Review: Key Challenges in Sustainable Consumption--This paper summarizes the literature addressing the challenges specific to sustainable consumption.
- Literature Review: Alternatives for Advancing Sustainable Production and Consumption through Government Programs and Policies--This document summarizes the results of a broad but limited literature review specific to program and policy alternatives that support sustainable production and consumption.

Upcoming Webinar : "The Crises In Employment, Consumption, Economic Growth, and the Environment: Could a Shorter Workweek and a Greener Economy Provide Relief?"

The MIT SDM Systems Thinking Webinar Series will host a webinar on March 11th from noon-1 pm EDT, featuring Nicholas A. Ashford, PhD., JD.

The presentation will address the crises we encounter today, which could be described as a 'perfect storm.' The financial crisis has left many with too little money and/or willingness to spend. This results in too few goods and services being produced and too little being purchased. This exacerbates unemployment and underemployment. As a result, less money is spent, further worsening the crisis. On the other hand, some consume too much from an energy and resource perspective, exacerbating environmental problems. Two solutions are frequently

suggested to the present crises: spread work out through a shorter workweek and green the economy. An analysis of the likelihood of success of each is the focus of this presentation.

Nicholas Ashford holds both a Ph.D. in Chemistry and a law degree from the University of Chicago, where he also received graduate education in economics. In addition to his recent book, he has co-authored *Environmental Law, Policy and Economics: Reclaiming the Environmental Agenda* and has published six additional books and several hundred articles in peer-reviewed journals and law reviews.

The MIT System Design and Management Program Systems Thinking Webinar Series features research conducted by SDM faculty, alumni, students, and industry partners. The series is designed to disseminate information on how to employ systems thinking to address engineering, management, and sociopolitical components of complex challenges.

Passing of a SCORAI Colleague

It is with great sadness that SCORAI conveys news about the death of Eugene (Gene) Rosa who died at home on February 27. A Regents Professor at Washington State University, Gene participated in the inaugural SCORAI workshop at Clark University in 2009 and his work on the <u>STIRPAT</u> (Stochastic Impacts by Regression on Population, Affluence, and Technology) Model (with Tom Dietz and Richard York) provides important empirical evidence of the extent to which consumption practices contribute to global environmental stress. In addition to his research on the relationship between consumption practices and anthropogenic environmental pressures, Gene made important scholarly contributions to other fields including the politics of nuclear energy, risk analysis, and the human dimensions of global environmental change.
