As much as possible, the speaker is asked to distribute a discussion paper prior to the webinar (these are generally "work-in-progress" drafts). At the August meeting Chuck Collins of the Institute for Policy Studies presented a paper on "Investing in the New Economy," in which he discussed many different opportunities for investing and ranked them according to their return on investment, liquidity, and social impact.

I also learned at the last meeting that a couple of weeks earlier there was a hearing at Boston City Hall about divesting the city's pension funds from big banks; and a hearing at the Massachusetts State House about divesting from the fossil fuel industry.

Previous webinars included presentations by Stacy Mitchell of the Institute for Local Self Reliance on their work on a localist policy agenda; Neal Gorenflo of Shareable on their report on Policies for Sharable Cities; Joe Uehlein of the Labor Network for Sustainability; Gwendolyn Hallsmith of Vermonters for a New Economy; and Dan Apfel of the Responsible Endowments Coalition.

New Book: The Housing Bomb

<u>The Housing Bomb: Why Our Addiction to Houses Is</u>
<u>Destroying the Environment and Threatening Our Society</u>.

Have we built our way to ruin? Is your desire for that beach house or cabin in the woods part of the environmental crisis? Do you really need a bigger home? Why don't multiple generations still live under one roof? In The Housing Bomb, leading environmental researchers M. Nils Peterson, Tarla Rai Peterson, and Jianguo Liu sound the alarm, explaining how and why our growing addiction to houses has taken the humble American dream and twisted it into an environmental and societal nightmare.

Without realizing how much a contemporary home already contributes to environmental destruction, most of us want bigger and bigger houses and dream of the day when we own not just one dwelling but at least the two our neighbor does. We push our children to "get out on their own" long before they need to, creating a second household where previously one existed. We pave and build, demolishing habitat needed by threatened and endangered species, adding to the mounting burden of global climate change, and sucking away resources much better applied to pressing societal needs. "Reduce, reuse, recycle" is seldom evoked in the housing world, where economists predict financial disasters when "new housing starts" decline and the idea of renovating inner city residences is regarded as merely a good cause.

Presenting irrefutable evidence, this book cries out for America and the world to intervene by making simple changes in our household energy and water usage and by supporting municipal, state, national, and international policies to counter this devastation and overuse of resources. It offers a way out of the mess we are creating and envisions a future where we all live comfortable, nondestructive lives. The "housing bomb" is ticking, and our choice is clear-change our approach or feel the blast.

SCORAl Design Workshop Next Spring

Emerging out of the <u>SCORAl conference last Spring</u> in Worcester is a group of design researchers interested in reframing sustainable design, production, and consumption.

Pending funding, the <u>University of Texas Center for Sustainable Development</u> will host researchers from the <u>University of Texas Sustainable Design Program</u>, the <u>Parsons New School Transdisiplinary Design Program</u> and <u>DESIS lab</u>, the <u>Carnegie Melon Design Program</u>, and others for a workshop next spring. The aim of this work is to advance sustainable design, production and consumption research in North America through three related activities: (1) bridging the divide between graduate sustainability programs in design and the social sciences; (2) identifying and advancing a collaborative and interdisciplinary research agenda; and (3) developing a publication program that would support the first two activities.
