Latin American Research and Practice Forum for Sustainable Consumption and Production



Researchers, practitioners and consultants from Latin America create the first multi-stakeholder network in the region for expanding and exchanging knowledge and experience on SPaC issues and solutions.

Jeffrey Barber and Philip Vergragt of the SCORAI Board and the GRF-SPaC Executive committee co-organized and participated in the first regional Latin America GRF workshop in Arequipa, Peru on October 22, 2014.

Representatives from academia, NGOs, state departments, Parliaments, and consultancies based in Brazil, Chile, Mexico, Peru, and the United States launched the Latin American Research & Practice Forum on SPaC/Fórum Latinoamericano de Investigación y Prácticas sobre Consumo y Producción Sostenible (FLIP-CPS).

This unique regional, multi-stakeholder network was founded during the first GRF-SPaC regional workshop: Strategies for Sustainable Production and Consumption Research in Latin America, hosted by the Arequipa Lawyers Association in the city of Arequipa, Peru on October 19, 2014. Over forty area experts and professionals gathered to discuss and take stock of existing research and practice on SPaC in the region, which led to the creation of a community of researchers and practitioners in Latin America with connections to the global GRF-SPaC community. The multi-sectorial, interdisciplinary composition of the Latin American Forum will be instrumental in effectively addressing obstacles for progress like fragmented topic information and duplication of research efforts in order to improve understanding of the challenges and alternatives toward a sustainability-driven society.

Maite Cortés, co-founder of the Forum, notes that "governments, organizations, and consumers from Latin America confront new challenges and opportunities, highly similar, in the pursuit of redressing the social and environmental drawbacks of the current unsustainable path to development." And she adds, "The multi-stakeholder composition of this unique regional Forum will enable a better articulation of ongoing efforts by different players to address those problems derived from unsustainable choices."

Fabián Echegaray, co-founder of the Forum, stresses that "this unique network has the advantage of counting with the first-hand experience of committed members working within NGOs, state offices, and legislative bodies in implementing sustainability policy and initiatives, and relying on the knowledge-based differentials provided by the community of researchers associated to GRF-SPaC." According to Echegaray, "Such capabilities facilitate an effective mapping of pathways and

alternatives for designing smooth transitions towards sustainable consumption and production solutions."

SCORAI China Working Group

The SCORAI Executive Board, in collaboration with colleagues at Renmin University in Beijing and the Environmental Policy Group at Wageningen
University in the Netherlands, has organized a SCORAI China Working Group to explore the potential of establishing a sister SCORAI network in China. An initial public meeting was convened to consider this initiative at the Second Biennial Meeting of the Global Research Forum on Sustainable Production and Consumption in June at Fudan University in Shanghai. The success of these discussions led to a decision to organize a workshop jointly coordinated by SCORAI and the School of Environment and Natural Resources at Renmin University that will be held on November 15-16, 2014 in Beijing. The workshop will include a plenary discussion to establish SCORAI China.

Professors Lei ZHANG and Ma ZHONG of the School of Environment and Natural Resources at Renmin University are hosting and coordinating the workshop (which will also include a forum for PhD students to present their research). The workshop is convened with the support of the Chinese Environmental Sociology Committee of the Chinese Sociological Association. Important assistance

has also been provided by Professors Arthur Mol and Gert Spaargaren.

Management Revue Call For Papers: Perspectives on Sustainable Consumption

management The problem of sustainability has received serious attention since the Club of Rome pointed to the limits of growth in 1972. Addressing ecological, economic and social issues, it is still a major--perhaps the biggest--challenge humanity faces. The problem demands attention by actors from all social levels. On

the micro-level, sustainable consumption is often regarded as the major way how individual consumers can contribute to sustainable development. By now a growing number of people are aware that many consumption habits have to be changed because they are in conflict with the goal of sustainable development. Yet, there is a gap between knowledge and action. Much research has been done in the last thirty years on sustainable consumption, exploring the motivations, practices, opportunities, and drivers for sustainable consumption from economic, psychological, and sociological perspectives. Despite this multidisciplinary effort and the often interdisciplinary nature of research on sustainable consumption, there is room for broadening the perspectives further. In particular, the link between political participation and sustainable consumption as a political statement as well as the link between various forms and objectives of political consumption deserves more attention. Further, the impact of societal inequality on sustainable consumption has not gained much attention. Especially research on the interaction between inequality, issues of security and precariousness, political participation and consumption behavior is lacking.

In the special issue and the corresponding seminar, we would like to discuss our topic in an adequately broad and interdisciplinary way. We are particularly interested in questions such as: Inequality (e.g., precariousness) and sustainable consumption; Citizenship and consumption; Sustainable consumption as a political statement; Quantitative and qualitative empirical studies on these issues. This is not an exhaustive list.

Deadline for abstracts is January 31, 2015.



Social Practices Project: The Built Environment & Sustainability Thinking Notes





The 'Practices, the Built Environment and Sustainability' (PBES) network has been established and organized by Dr Chris Foulds from the Global Sustainability Institute (GSI) at Anglia Ruskin

University in Cambridge, and by Dr Charlotte Louise Jensen from the Center for Design, Innovation and Sustainable Transitions (DIST) at the Aalborg University Campus Copenhagen. The PBES network is constituted by 18 outstanding early career researchers who met the criteria of the Call and Review process, for which there was overwhelming interest with over six applications per network position.

Over the summer, the network has produced a collection of nine Thinking Notes exploring the usefulness as well as the potential gaps of theories of practices in relation to exploring studies of the built environment and sustainability, and the network recently came together to present the Thinking Notes. The Notes have received feedback from Prof. Susse Georg, Dr Russell Hitchings, Dr Yolande Strengers, Prof. Elizabeth Shove, Dr Tom Hargreaves and Dr Dan Welch, and the network is supported by GSI, DIST AAU and BSA Climate Change Study Group.

Prix Pictet Photography Contest Consumption Theme

The Prix Pictet is the world's leading prize in photography and sustainability. The theme of the fifth



cycle of the Prix Pictet is Consumption. Consumption lies at the heart of the Prix Pictet's mission to bring global attention to what we believe is the greatest challenge facing humankind today: the issue of environmental sustainability.

It is a multi-faceted theme that is rich with creative potential. We are all consumers. We have invented new forms of building, industrial production, farming and energy; we have emptied the seas and ravaged the land in our relentless drive to satisfy our unquenchable desires. We have built vast empires based on luxury goods, creating demand for essentials that we didn't know we

needed. We have sustained this through the sometimes thoughtless exploitation of the world's poorest people.

The Shortlist of eleven artists selected for the Fifth Cycle of the Prix Pictet, was announced at the Musée d'Art Moderne de la Ville in Paris on November 13, 2013. The winner was announced on May 21, 2014 at the opening of an exhibition of works by the shortlisted artists at the Victoria and Albert Museum, London. German photographer **Michael Schmidt** was named as the fifth laureate of the Prix Pictet for his series Lebensmittel by honorary president, Kofi Annan. Three days after the announcement was made Michael Schmidt sadly passed away aged 68.

Sustainability Science Fellowships at Harvard University: Doctoral, Post-doctoral, and Midcareer Fellowships

The Sustainability Science Program at Harvard University invites applications for resident fellowships

in sustainability science for the academic year beginning in September 2015. This year's competition is focused on three thematic areas related to energy and sustainability. We are seeking applications focusing on: 1) decarbonizing energy systems in the European Union; 2) designing, developing, and/or implementing sustainable energy technologies and policies in China; and 3) the impacts of fossil fuel subsidies on economic, environmental, and health indicators and the actions that can be taken to reduce them. Steven Moore, Bartlett Cocke Regents Professor of Architecture and Planning, has been selected as a finalist for the 2014 Thomas Ehrlich Civically Engaged Faculty Award. The award is given annually by the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) to senior faculty who have demonstrated a career-long commitment to teaching through civic-engagement. A core criteria for the award states:

New Publications



Middlemiss, Lucie. 2014. "Individualised or Participatory? Exploring Late-Modern Identity and Sustainable Development." *Environmental Politics*, August, 1-18.

Abstract

The *idea* of individualisation is powerful: in late-modern society, people's sense of identity is based on their individual experience rather than their relationships with others. This is problematic for sustainable development because it conflicts with the *ideal* of participation enshrined in its theory and practice. It is also unclear how the idea plays out in this field, with emerging evidence that some sustainable development policy and practice is individualising. The *realities* of individualisation are more complex. Empirical studies outside sustainable development have shown that individualising policy does not necessarily have individualising effects.

Considering how the *idea* and *realities* of individualisation cast new light on subjectivities imagined in sustainable development theory and practice, I argue that sustainable development scholars and practitioners need to consider a range of late-modern subjectivities, and be critically aware of how individualisation is potentially reproduced in policy and practice.

Smith, Adrian. 2014. "Technology Networks for socially useful production." *Journal of Peer Production*, April 23.

Abstract

Though largely forgotten now, Technology Networks were community-based prototyping workshops supported by the Greater London Council from 1983 until 1986. They emerged out of a movement for socially useful production. Recalling the radical roots and conflicted experiences of the workshops brings to the fore issues still relevant today: tensions between prototyping activities for business development as distinct from more critical technological agit prop for political mobilisation; working at equitable relations between codified, formal expertise versus tacit, experiential skills; and the influences of broader political and economic changes and wider movements for alternatives. After careful historical contextualisation, lessons are drawn for workshops today, but which will inevitably play out differently, hopefully after learning from the past.

Description

The dynamism of science has been catalytic for human prosperity in recent history. Conventional perspectives of the ivory tower model of modern science are, however, rivalled by the failure of humanity to tackle global crises of an economic, environmental and social nature. Operational solutions to these pressures have grown and exposed pitfalls of modern science to date. Sustainability Science for Strong Sustainability investigates core concepts, tools and institutional strategies of transdisciplinary sustainability science.
