

Our Mission

Sustainable Consumption Research and Action Initiative (SCORAI) is a North American knowledge network of professionals working at the interface of material consumption, human well-being, and technological and cultural change. Our mission is to foster a transition beyond the currently dominant consumer society. The network provides an intellectual platform for scholars and practitioners who are seeking to better understand the drivers of the consumerist economy in affluent technological societies; to formulate options for post-consumerist lifestyles, social institutions, and economic systems; to provide the knowledge base for emergent processes of socio-technical change through grassroots innovations, social movements, public policy, and cultural transitions.

Our Partners

The SCORAI network partners with several organizations. It is a founding member of the North American Roundtable on Sustainable Production and Consumption (NARSPAC) and a member of the <u>New Economy Coalition</u>. Internationally, it partners with SCORAI-Europe and with the <u>Global Research Forum on</u> <u>Sustainable Production and Consumption (GRF-SPaC)</u>. GRF-SPaC is in the process of organizing a regional workshop in Arequipa, Peru, back-to-back the <u>global conference organized by</u> <u>the World Resources Forum October 19-22</u>. Notes from a May New Economy Coalition Consultative Call



Ed Whitfield, Executive Director, Fund for Democratic DEMOCRATIC Communities, Greensboro, North Carolina, talked on "Building New Economies in The American South."

The Fund for Democratic Communities was conceived in 2007, and works to build authentically south-wide movement around economic justice and grassroots democratic economies. The Southern Federation of Worker Cooperatives hosted gatherings in 2012 and 2013, which are geared towards people most affected by a broken economy- African American community, poor white community, immigrant community, women.

Ed's work in Jackson, Mississippi, began in the spring of 2012, initially with a gathering of 80-90 people. The city of Jackson needed a large gathering: white flight had led to economic decline, but the city remains a transportation crossroads and state capital, and has an organized core of people. Jackson Rising -- a large gathering of the cooperative movement -- has been its most successful project to date. It focused on capacity building and learning.

Ed reported on the growing interest among the philanthropic organizations in supporting the movement. Some of the key questions being discussed: 1) in what way can the micro lending structure be adjusted to support cooperatives, and how can we make sure there is adequate partnership and training and 2) relation to the divest/invest movement.

The discussion focused on the fundamental question for the New Economy Coalition: creating a unity among groups representing different constituencies and types of grievances. Ed stressed that resistance to the status quo is the unifying force.

The Industrial Ecology Group at the University of Lausanne Awarded Sustainable Consumption Grants



The <u>Industrial Ecology Group</u> at the University of Lausanne has been awarded two grants by the <u>Swiss</u> <u>Academies of Arts and Sciences</u>, Sustainable Development at

Universities Programme, focused on both 'sustainable consumption' teaching and research. Antonietta Di Giulio at the Inter-/Transdisciplinarity Research Group at the University of Basel, in partnership with Marlyne Sahakian at the University of Lausanne will be leading a three-year project titled 'Anchoring inter- and trans-disciplinary sustainable consumption research in Swiss universities'. Building on the SCORAI network, we plan to bring together researchers and practitioners from different academic disciplines and professional fields, to further develop and deliver 'sustainable consumption' research proposals that include Swiss researchers. One of the first steps will be to identify key methodological challenges in sustainable consumption research. With Suren Erkman at the University of Lausanne, Marlyne Sahakian will also be leading a project titled 'Teaching '(un)sustainable consumption' at Swiss universities' which would involve identifying best practices and innovative approaches in

Achieving Sustainable Development on a Mountainous Island: Marina Fischer-Kowalski reports on an Erasmus Course

April 30 - May 12, 2014, organized by the Institute of Social Ecology, Vienna. Responsible Prof. Marina Fischer-Kowalski



The course was designed as a nine days excursion to the island of Samothraki in Greece with the aim to learn and apply social ecology approaches in a local setting while building synergy with an on-going UNESCO Man and Biosphere process. Since 2007, the <u>Institute of Social Ecology Vienna</u> (SEC) has coordinated research on Samothraki, an archaic mountainous island in the north-eastern corner of the Aegean archipelago endowed with high cultural and natural assets. However, imminent threats (unplanned tourism, overgrazing, waste accumulation) to the island's heritage prompted SEC, in collaboration with locals, to develop a vision to transform the island into a UNESCO Man-and-Biosphere Reserve. In a participatory process the initiative was gradually transferred to a broader base of local stakeholders and 9/25/2014 NJ Institute of Technology Mail - Your campaign SCORAI Newsletter (Sustainable Consumption Research and Action Initiative) has been sent

the island is soon to become the first new generation BR in Greece. This on-going process, sponsored by the Austrian MAB committee, has been highly acknowledged, including the Sustainability Award 2010 it received from the Austrian Ministry of Science and Research.

Both students and teachers were absolutely enthusiastic about the course, extremely hard working (everybody climbed several hundred meters up and down the mountains every day), and in the end very interesting research results were produced that will be used to inform the stakeholders on the island.

Abstract


In recent years, there has been growing interest in applying social practice theory to theorizing consumption, specifically in relation to transforming practices that have

problematic environmental impacts. In this paper, we address the questions: how do changes in practices occur, and what are the levers for influencing change towards more sustainable consumption practices? We argue that a view of agency distributed across people, things and social contexts is fruitful. We also explore learning through membership in communities of practice, where people are involved in experiments with or exposure to new practices. We relate three case studies in the arena of food consumption practices then discuss the practicalities and pitfalls involved in translating social practice approaches into practicable recommendations for encouraging more sustainable forms of consumption.
